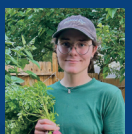
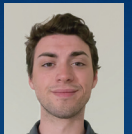

Mission

To advance the conservation and appreciation of Missouri's natural resources, including fish, forest and wildlife, by working with donors and other conservation partners to financially support the mission and priorities of the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) at the statewide, national and international level.

History

Founded in 1997, MCHF is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization. One of MCHF's first projects was to raise \$3.6 million in matching funds to construct the Anita B. Gorman Conservation Discovery Center. Additionally, since administering the Stream Stewardship Trust Fund (SSTF) in 1999, MCHF has dispersed more than \$6.9 million for priority stream protection efforts while working with MDC and other stream partners statewide.

Since our founding in 1997, we have allocated over \$27 million for conservation funding statewide, plus \$13.3 million to the Johnny Morris Institute of Fisheries, Wetlands and Aquatic Systems. MCHF is governed by a volunteer board of directors comprised of conservation, community and business leaders.

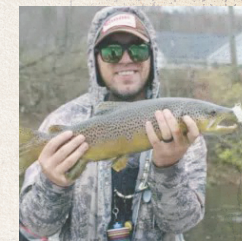

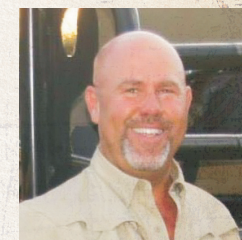

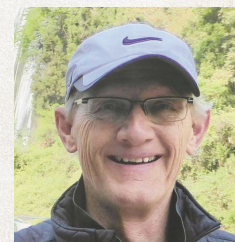

The Johnny Morris Institute Expands Partnerships with Nationwide Conservation Leaders

Clean water and healthy ecosystems have never been more important to our health, safety and future. Healthy wetlands and aquatic systems and sustainable fish and wildlife populations do not happen by accident. Many plants and animals depend on healthy ecosystems and could become threatened if those water habitats were destroyed. We need inspired, educated and trained conservation stewards to bring innovative expertise and research that will be used to work toward a sustainable planet.

To advance the wellness of our watersheds improving all quality of life, MCHF, MDC and MU established the Institute of Fisheries, Wetlands and Aquatic Systems at MU in March 2023.

A few months later in September, the MU Board of Curators approved naming the institute after Bass Pro Shops' founder and one of America's leading conservationists, Johnny Morris. The Johnny Morris Institute of Fisheries, Wetlands and Aquatic Systems is creating a national model for private and public partnerships that advance sustainable conservation of fisheries, wetlands and other aquatic systems.

The vision is to create a national model for public/private partnerships to bring together fisheries, wetlands and aquatic systems into an integrated area of study to not only further science, but also cultivate future talent in the conservation field.

This national institute will train and cultivate the next generation of conservation professionals by providing students with coursework and career pathways with real-world field training through the Chip and Teresa McGeehan Career Pathways Program. Additionally, the Johnny Morris Institute will serve as a national center for research, knowledge and best management practices impacting fisheries, wildlife, wetlands and aquatic systems.

MCHF, MDC and MU have been working hard to bring together new partners to support and build awareness of the Johnny Morris Institute.

Bass Pro Shops & Cabela's Outdoor Fund: A nonprofit supporting thousands of local projects and leading conservation partners across North America. The Outdoor Fund was instrumental in the naming of the Johnny Morris Institute honoring Bass Pro Shops Founder, Johnny Morris.



Major League Fishing (MLF): MLF is the largest tournament fishing organization in the world. Serving as the official research partner of the Johnny Morris Institute, MLF provides data from their fishing tournaments for research-based courses where undergraduates work to analyze this data and look for areas of concern within fish biology, habitat and water.



Bolder River Outdoors: Based out of Sedalia, Mo., these high-end duck hunting blinds are designed by engineers to last a lifetime. As a partner, Bolder River is the official duck blind of MCHF supporting the Johnny Morris Institute by donating a portion of each duck hunting blind sale to the institute.

Nearly 1,000 student archers from six states compete at Border Wars

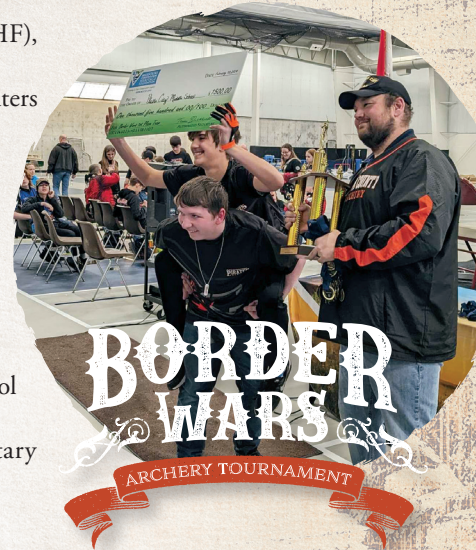
In partnership with Missouri Conservation Heritage Foundation (MCHF), Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Kansas Wildscape Foundation and Kansas Bowhunters Association, the third annual Border Wars Archery Tournament was held Feb. 17 and 18, 2024 at Johnson County Community College in Kansas. Archers from Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Iowa, Kentucky and Nebraska all came to compete for \$1,500 to the top team in each division, \$100 gift cards, sponsored by Visit Overland Park, individual medals, trophies, and of course, bragging rights.

New Daniel Duncan Archery in the Schools Scholarship Fund Supports Missouri Youth Archers at the MoNASP State Tournament

MCHF is thrilled to announce the establishment of the Daniel Duncan Archery in the Schools Scholarship Fund, increasing the number of scholarships awarded to student archers at the MoNASP State Tournament beginning March 2024.

Missouri native and avid conservation supporter, Daniel “Dan” Duncan from Columbia, Mo., has donated to MCHF, creating a scholarship fund for the MoNASP State Tournament which will support and encourage Missouri youth archers to build confidence and character through the sport of archery.

“The archery in the schools program seemed a perfect fit,” said Dan. “While it’s primarily indoor, it’s likely to lead to a generation of bowhunters taking to the field. It’s also encouraging that everyone can succeed in archery, regardless of age, gender, social or physical status.”

A couple of years ago, while discussing their last will and testament, Dan’s father and mother, Joe and Carole Duncan, decided to give their sons an advance portion of their estate to donate to a charity of their choosing. Instantly, Dan knew he wanted to donate to a cause in conservation that would help young people in their outdoor pursuits.

Dan and Joe were referred to MCHF and after talking with MCHF Executive Director, Tricia Burkhardt, they both knew without hesitation that archery was an excellent fit. “When we heard the word archery, I’m sure we rattled her eardrums, as we said excitedly, ‘Archery! That’s what we want!’” said Joe.

Previously, MCHF was able to award \$20,000 in scholarships to the top three overall male and females in both bullseye and 3D at the MoNASP State tournament through \$10,000 from MCHF, which includes the Chip and Teresa McGeehan Archery in the Schools Conservation Fund, and a matching grant of \$10,000 from the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP).

Now, with the help of the Daniel Duncan Archery in the Schools Scholarship Fund and an additional \$5,000 from NASP, MCHF can now award \$30,000 in scholarships to the top five male and female archers in both bullseye and 3D at the MoNASP State Tournament.

Specifically, this fund will support scholarships for the fifth-place male and female archers in both bullseye and 3D. These scholarships are awarded to students to be used for their education endeavors after graduation.

“This scholarship fund is an incredible opportunity to offer more student archers support they may need after they graduate high school,” said MCHF Executive Director Tricia Burkhardt. “Scholarships given out at the MoNASP State Tournament have made a profound impact on the experiences of youth archers creating new and more personal relationships with conservation and the outdoors. We are so thankful to Dan and his family for their passion for conservation as we award the top male and females for their focus, accuracy and integrity at the state tournament.”

MoNASP is an affiliate of NASP, promoting education, self-esteem and physical activity for students in grades 4-12. MoNASP has grown exponentially to over 800 Missouri schools and 200,000 students exposing more youth to outdoor sports and activities. The MoNASP State Tournament is the second largest state archery tournament in the nation, and in 2024 brought together more than 4,300 student archers competing in 3D and Bullseye and 19,000 spectators.

NEW! Open Outdoor 3D Archery Tournament debuted August 12, 2023

In partnership with MCHF, MDC, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and Mark Twain Lake FOREST Council, archers of all ages and shooting levels came together for fun competition at Mark Twain Lake Archery Park for the first annual Open Outdoor 3D Archery Tournament.

On Saturday, Aug. 12, 2023, nearly 200 archers of all ages and shooting levels competed to test their skills against the forest. Participants could choose to shoot NASP, Open Compound, Bow Hunter, Traditional/Barebow and Championship. Archers from different backgrounds including National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) participants, coaches, parents, archery influencers and semi-professionals, hunters and outdoor enthusiasts enjoyed this fun summer event.

This event is unique as it has two trail-style 3D archery ranges with 20 targets each, totaling 40 targets. Archers shoot one arrow per target for the chance to win medals and cash prizes. This tournament is a one-day, family-friendly event supporting Missouri youth archery and outdoor programs. In addition to the 3D range, the Iron Buck Challenge added another level of competition against other participants in a classic one-arrow challenge through an iron deer target.

Known for their powerful fights, bass are a favorite among anglers and appeals to anglers everywhere. Not only is the bass a top gamefish in Missouri, but it's one of the tastiest freshwater gamefish in North America.

Bats for the Future Fund

December 14, 2023, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) announced \$769,000 in grants were awarded to implement fungal treatment methods and enhance habitat management to reduce the impacts of white-nose syndrome (WNS) in the states of Missouri, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Washington and the provinces of British Columbia and Ontario.

The grants were awarded through the Bats for the Future Fund (BFF), a partnership between NFWF and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Avangrid Foundation, Southern Company and NextEra Energy Resources.

MCHF is proud to be among the awardees for this grant. MCHF will utilize existing partnerships with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and others to protect and enhance habitats for the Indiana Bat in the Soldaris Nature Preserve through tree planting and various forest management strategies which promote tree species of importance to the Indiana bat lifecycle.

Friends of Emerald Valley in Honduras

Our international work in other countries supports a variety of wildlife that we hold dear, including the Monarch butterfly and migratory birds.

Robert Gallardo and Olivia Diaz, creators of the Guide to the Birds of Honduras and newly published Guide to the Butterflies of Honduras, which MCHF supported, has officially been released! However, the work is not done! This country is home to high biodiversity levels, but many different pressures make it hard to protect preserves and wildlife populations. Their work helps educate people in Honduras and around the world about the importance of protecting our natural resources.



MCHF is proud to have partnered with Emerald Valley International Butterfly Center in Honduras and the Friends of Emerald Valley over the last couple of years to help this wonderful butterfly center and preserve extend the reach of their work. Most recently, they have been able to move forward on purchasing an additional 15+ acres with a grant facilitated by MCHF. Since then, they have been presented with another opportunity to buy more land to expand the preserve.

What does Honduras have to do with Missouri conservation, you might ask? Many Missouri native species migrate to this area in Honduras in the cooler months! Your support allows them to expand and continue doing this great work to support healthy ecosystems for native wildlife.

Land Acquisition in Dade County Named to Honor the Berrier Family

The Missouri Conservation Commission approved the naming of a new 160-acre conservation area in Dade County to honor the Berrier family for their generous donation to MCHF for public grassland acquisition. The new area will be named the Dr. Harry and Lina Berrier Memorial Tract to Sons Creek Conservation Area.

“Dr. Harry and Lina Berrier would be delighted to see their donation used to acquire prairie property that will be incredibly impactful in benefiting native grasslands and all the species that need it, like wildflowers, birds, pollinators, quail, amphibians and reptiles,” said MCHF Executive Director Tricia Burkhardt. “We are pleased to partner with the Missouri Conservation Commission and MDC to help connect more grasslands in this property.” The conservation area is located five miles northwest of Lockwood off Dade County Road 41. The new Sons Creek Conservation Area will be reconstructed by MDC staff into a diverse grassland of native grasses and wildflowers. Trees and other woody vegetation will be removed to create an open grassland vista. Once completed, the new conservation area will provide additional hunting and wildlife viewing opportunities in southwest Missouri.

The Dr. Harry and Lina Berrier Memorial Tract will help enhance conservation efforts on the Penn-Sylvania Prairie, which has been recognized as setting the world record for the number of plant species found in a 20X20-inch square.

Prairies are diverse native grasslands that have had little to no soil disturbance such as plowing or cultivation and have an abundance of native forbs and grasses and few woody plants. When the first settlers arrived, more than one-third of the state – approximately 15 million acres – was prairie. Today, fewer than 45,000 acres of native prairie remain. MCHF is proud to support Missouri prairies which include pollinators, monarch and other wildlife habitats.

Opening weekend at the Music Park, the mallard hen dropped another fresh egg and began to sit on her full nest of eggs all during the shows.

Because mallard eggs are federally protected, and to do their part for conservation, coordinators at the music park decided to embrace this new adventure and launch a fundraising campaign. We are honored that they chose MCHF as the beneficiary!

Saint Louis Music Park launched this fundraising campaign to raise awareness for mallards and benefit future wildlife conservation by hosting a “Baby Shower” where they asked followers and event attendees to donate to MCHF for a chance to win tickets to their Sarah McLachlan concert on June 10, 2024. The eggs hatched and adorable ducklings explored the music venue. Saint Louis Music Park protected the nest from concert goers while also allowing nature to take its course.

Swan Lake Dedication and Ken Babcock Tribute

Oct. 14, 2023, Ducks Unlimited and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services held a special dedication and tribute to Ken Babcock to celebrate the completed wetland project on Swan Lake National Wildlife Refuge (NWR), three miles north of Sumner, Mo.

This project improved water management capability and restored natural water flow patterns and drainage regimes on Swan Lake NWR. Specifically, this project reconfigured wetland management units and installed new water control structures to improve management efficiency and increase sustainability. Overall project results improved habitat conditions and food resources for several priority wildlife species, which better emulates the natural hydrology that once occurred on the refuge and will reduce annual maintenance and personnel costs associated with managing the refuge.

The 10,795-acre Swan Lake NWR is in the floodplain of the Grand River, adjacent to Yellow Creek. The refuge's diversity of habitats supports waterfowl, wading birds, shorebirds and songbirds.

About Ken Babcock Tribute

Ken, of Jamestown, Mo. has a lifelong commitment to and passion for waterfowl and wetland conservation. He joined MDC from 1970 through 1997 where he worked as a waterfowl research biologist, Assistant Chief and Division Chief of Wildlife Division and Assistant Director from 1989-1997. After retiring from MDC, Ken went to work for Ducks Unlimited retiring in 2013 as Senior Director of Conservation. After retiring (again), he and his wife, Betty Rose, moved back to Missouri. He is a life member of the Conservation Federation of Missouri, a member of the National Wild Turkey Federation and a member of The Wildlife Society for more than 50 years. During his career he was actively involved with the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, Midwest and Southeast Associations of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, Mississippi Flyway Council and Technical Section, The Wildlife Society and served on the Corps of Engineers Environmental Advisory Board.

Even in retirement, he remains passionate for wetlands and the people who enjoy and benefit from them. Ken serves as an Ex-Officio Advisor on the MCHF Board of Directors and was a past Chairman. Ken has also contributed his knowledge and support on the establishment of the Johnny Morris Institute of Fisheries, Wetlands and Aquatic Systems, a partnership between MCHF, University of Missouri and MDC to advance the wellness of our watersheds improving all quality of life.

Ken was also recognized and honored with the Missouri Legacy Conservation Award on Nov. 2, 2023 at the National Lewis & Clark Conservation Awards.

Students Connecting with Nature in Boone County

A new idea has taken hold in one Missouri community that will have long-lasting effects in the lives of students and teachers alike. The Boone County Nature School, a partnership between MDC and the Columbia Public School District, opened its doors to more than 3,000 student visitors during the 2022-2023 school year.

The property boasts a new 8,230-square-foot building, that houses four nature-themed classrooms, lab space, nature and student-related lobby exhibits, and offices on 111 acres of learning. The building and associated grounds serve students from all six Boone County school districts through unique "place-based" education as well as the public through special conservation-related programming. MCHF was proud to support this project to develop environmental education unlike any in the nation.

MCHF Board Awarded Grants

Each year, the MCHF board of directors considers requests for grants from MDC, outside nonprofits, governmental, and other non-governmental organizations that are consistent with the missions and objectives of MCHF and MDC. Project approval is based upon availability of unrestricted and undesignated funds.

Grants awarded for 2024 include:

Discover Nature Field Day

MCHF sponsored the 17th Annual Discover Nature Field Day last month at James A. Reed Wildlife Area by providing a grant to purchase water bottles to keep everyone hydrated in the summer heat! In the past, MDC staff (the hosts) have struggled to help kids stay adequately hydrated during the day of outdoor activities due to many of the participants not having a water bottle of their own. They have experienced zero heat related issues since starting the water bottle program - an easy solution to help ensure more kids are able to get out and interact with the outdoors.



Nearly 700 kids and staff from the Greater KC Boys & Girls Clubs attended to discover nature and learn new outdoor skills. Students spent the day fishing, birding, paddling, trying out air rifles, insect collecting, and more!

Exploratory Backpacks

This funding was used to purchase 25 exploratory backpacks for students to use while at the Boone County Nature School. These backpacks hold resources for participants to use while experiencing nature. The backpacks are designed to initiate an interest in science, encourage outdoor exploration and to help facilitate the development of observation and identification skills.



Woody Vegetation Response in the Chilton Creek Fire Study

The purpose of this grant is to collect woody vegetation data in permanently established plots in the Chilton south unit beginning Dec 2023, prior to restarting fire treatments in 2024, and report the structural and compositional effects associated with the eight-year fire-free interval.



Wentzville Public Middle School Outdoor Pursuits Classes

This program connects students to nature and allows students to have a way to relax, decompress and know there is a healthy outlet with nature they may not have been aware of or exposed to. MCHF was able to support by purchasing fire pits and Dutch ovens to give the program the opportunity to learn about outdoor cooking with the correct tools.

Urban Rangers Canoe Trip

The naturalist staff at the Gorman Discovery Center are partnering with Urban Ranger Corps of Kansas City to prepare and lead approximately 28 teen boys on a three-day trip to the Ozarks in July 2024. Funding for this trip will purchase storage buckets and water bottles.



Springfield Public Schools Backpacking and Camping

MDC educators will train nine middle school teachers on backpacking and camping. Funds were used to purchase two classroom sets of backpacks, tents and other supplies. These items will continue to add an in-depth learning layer to the Outdoor Awareness program Springfield Public Schools has administered for several years.

Lamine River Hunt Club Archery

This grant awarded is helping the Lamine River Hunt Club to start an archery range so three local NASP schools can practice during the off season and be exposed to archery in the outdoors. MCHF was able to help the Hunt Club purchase 10 3D targets.



Youth Hunter Education Clinics & Mentored Hunts

MCHF is helping purchase items for hunter education clinics and mentored hunt events.



Missouri River Bird Observatory (MRBO) – Arrow Rock Nature School

MRBO has developed a "Nature School" with the goal of introducing students to nature and the conservation of natural resources. This grant was used for purchasing materials such as aquatic nets, water test kits, visual aids and animal related models/replicas to help facilitate and grow nature education opportunities.



Recognizing Our Conservation Leaders



"We are proud to recognize conservation champions who impact conservation across the state, as well as this country," said Bob Fry, president of the MCHF Board of Directors. "This year's awardees represented leaders in business, philanthropy and conservation and their incredible commitment to the outdoors."

The eighth annual National Lewis & Clark Conservation Awards ceremony was held Thursday, November 2, 2023, at the Millbottom in Jefferson City, Mo. MCHF recognized individuals and organizations that lead the charge for the appreciation and conservation of our natural resources in Missouri and beyond.

Cody Stokes, CEO and founder of Dive Bomb Industries was honored with the **Corps of Discovery National Conservation Award**. This award is the highest award given by MCHF for leadership in conservation at the national level. The award is given to an individual based upon exemplary service, inspiration and commitment to benefit the conservation cause.

Stokes and his company's products have inspired people to get outdoors and hunt, thereby supporting conservation efforts. With Squadfest, Stokes shares waterfowl knowledge by bringing together experts, outdoor enthusiasts and families. As a board member of Great Rivers Habitat Alliance, his work to preserve the confluence floodplain and his work with Ducks Unlimited impacts generations to come. Dive Bomb Industries was established in 2011 by Stokes. Since then, the company has grown into one of the best-marketed and most versatile waterfowl hunting decoys in the game.

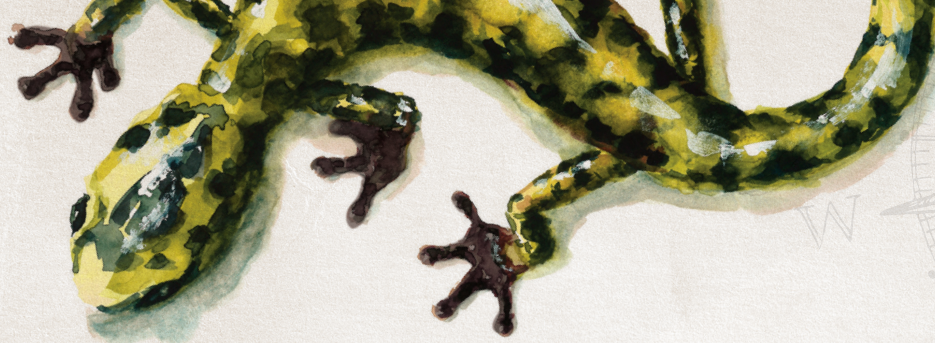
Grant Woods, creator and host of GrowingDeer.tv and President of Woods & Associates was awarded with the **Pat Jones/York Spirit of the Wilderness National Conservation Award**. This award goes to an individual who has dedicated their life to promotion, protection and service of wilderness and natural resources throughout Missouri. The award is in honor of York, a pivotal contributor to the success of the Lewis & Clark Expedition and in honor of Pat Jones, spouse of Edward "Ted" Jones, for the dynamic role she has played in conservation in Missouri. Pat Jones was the first recipient of the award in 2016 and her name was added to it in 2017.

Woods shares his love for managing and growing white-tailed deer, by providing current and useful information about deer hunting and deer management through GrowingDeer.tv for free online. He shares his expertise with the current and next generation of conservation professionals and whoever is interested. Woods has made a difference to so many people by educating the public about how to manage and conserve our most popular game species on their own land.

Chip McGeehan, owner and operator of McDonald's franchises in southwest Missouri, was honored with the **Governor's State of Missouri Conservation Award**. This award goes to an individual who reflects the spirit of conservation, shows outstanding leadership and has positively contributed to conservation principles and programs in Missouri and beyond.

McGeehan's lifelong leadership and commitment to conservation has impacted many lives. From supporting youth archery and conservation scholarships to helping disabled youth and veterans hunt to supporting turkey habitat research, his dedication to conserving the future of Missouri's outdoor legacy is inspiring. Chip served as the Commissioner of the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) for six years helping champion the re-introduction of elk into the state's wildlife population and later overseeing the development of habitats of Missouri's black bear population. Chip and his wife, Teresa, own and operate 19 McDonalds restaurants from Eldon and Lebanon to Stafford, and Ozark and Nixa in the Ozarks.

Burns & McDonnell, a company based in Kansas City providing engineering, architecture, construction, environmental and consulting solutions, was presented with the **Sacagawea Community and Partnership Conservation Award**. This award goes to an organization focused on exceptional community and partnership building resulting in progressive changes in conservation programs.

After retiring from MDC, Ken went to Ducks Unlimited, retiring in 2013 as Senior Director of Conservation. He has served with many organizations in many capacities, including as a life member of the Conservation Federation of Missouri, a member of the National Wild Turkey Federation, member of The Wildlife Society for more than 50 years, and served on the Corps of Engineers Environmental Advisory Board.

Kevin Roper, former executive director of MCHF was bestowed with the *Exemplary Service Conservation Award*. Kevin has served as a trailblazer, mentor and leader for the foundation, helping transform it into what it is today. His outstanding and direct service to Missouri conservation has made a significant impact to many individuals and organizations.

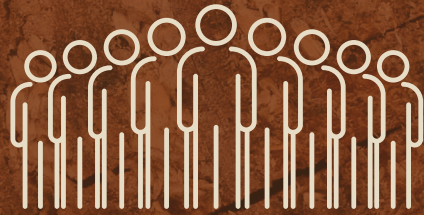

Champion of Conservation



Ken Babcock

Conservation Background:

- Graduated from Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas with a Bachelor of Arts degree in biology in 1965.
- Graduated from Louisiana State University with a Master of Science degree in wildlife management in 1967.
- Started his career as a Waterfowl Biologist by the Mississippi Game and Fish Commission from 1967-1970.
- Came to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) in 1970 and held many positions including Research Scientist, Assistant Wildlife Division Chief and Assistant Director.
- After retiring from MDC, he worked at Ducks Unlimited as Director of Operations overseeing conservation work in 22 states.

Rick and Lotsie Holton are members of the Founder's Conservation Society, with cumulative giving of \$100,000 or more. They have pledged \$5,000 each year for the next five years, and each year are making their donation in honor of a Champion of Conservation of their choosing. Meet the fourth Champion—**Ken Babcock**.

Why is conservation important to you?

Early in life, Ken learned from personal observation and stories that natural ecosystems were being negatively impacted by a growing human population to meet their needs. Wildlife populations and plant communities supporting them were declining at alarming rates. Although he spent a lot of time outdoors during his youth, he did not see white-tailed deer in the wild until his junior year of high school, and was in graduate school before seeing his first turkey. Ken was fortunate enough to learn that a growing number of people, including landowners, scientists, journalists and others were working to address these trends and he wanted to be a part of those efforts by establishing relationships with others to find ways that human needs and those of wildlife, fish and natural systems can be better understood so that more informed decisions can be achieved.

What is your biggest conservation achievement?

After more than a half-century of involvement in the conservation arena, Ken has been fortunate to participate in many conservation achievements, but none of these were accomplished alone.

Ken believes one's legacy should be determined by others. However, he hopes he is seen as one who respects the opinions of others regarding conservation while serving as the voice for wildlife and natural systems.

While controversial at times, he was glad to work on the conversion from lead shot to non-toxic shot for waterfowl hunting to address lead poisoning of ducks, geese, and other wetland-associated birds. This decision was a major factor leading to the recovery of the bald eagle, our national symbol. After witnessing the loss of bottomland forests for many years, while working for DU, Ken was privileged to be a part of developing a partnership with the United States Department of Agriculture to restore more than 300,000 acres of bottomland wetlands in the Lower Mississippi Alluvial Valley.

What is your favorite Missouri outdoor memory?

Ken's first memory of the Missouri outdoors occurred a few years before actually living in Missouri. As he was completing his graduate degree, Ken told his major professor that he thought working for a state conservation agency was a good fit for his professional goals and asked him which state had the best program. Without hesitation, he said, "Missouri." It took a few years, but eventually, Ken was fortunate to be selected for a wetlands/waterfowl research position in Columbia and the rest is history.
